RUSSELL WIRTH LANE: Ever wonder about the road adjacent to Manchester ballfields? Russell Wirth Lane is 3 blocks long and named for Pvt Russell Lee Wirth - US Army. Born in 1923 in Bonhomme (an early name for this area), he enlisted in the Army in 1943, and was on board the LST-531 off the coast of England in April 1944 when torpedoed by a German boat during rehearsal for the D-Day Normandy invasion. He was listed as Missing in Action, memorialized in the Cambridge American Cemetery and awarded the Purple Heart. Russell's nephew, Melvin Koester and family were in attendance at the dedication ceremony.

DEAN REITER AVENUE: Intersecting with Russell Wirth Lane next to MAA is Dean Reiter Avenue, running one block long on the south end of Henry Ave and Manchester Rd. First Lieutenant Dean Wesley Reiter of the US Marine Corps was born in 1942 in Manchester. Lt Reiter was serving in South Vietnam in 1966 when he was shot down while co-piloting a Marine helicopter for a medical evacuation. The aircraft exploded and burst into flames with him and 2 other Marines on board, the bodies were not recovered.

SPC. MATTHEW WALKER WAY: Army Specialist Matthew H. Walker, an infantryman in the 101st Airborne who grew up in St Louis and Hillsboro, died in 2014 in Southeast Afghanistan. His mother, a St Louis police detective, reported that his vehicle was hit by a rocket propelled grenade.

Matthew was a football team captain for the Grandview Eagles in Jefferson County. He signed up for the Army while a senior in high school, and said he wanted to be on the front lines to serve his country, and graduated in 2012. His father and grandfather also served in the military. Manchester city has since re-named a two-block street near 141 and Manchester Rd off Creve Coeur Ave behind Commerce Bank in his honor, which is next to MUMC where his grandparents attend.
